Business Manager's Report

Here we are at the end of another work season. As it has been for the last few years, and I'm sure you are all aware, the work is plentiful. At the Federal level, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, which was signed in 2021 by the President, allocates \$59.9 billion in funding for Fiscal Year 2023, which is an increase of \$15.4 billion from 2021. These funds will go directly to all 50 states to support investment in critical infrastructure, like bridges, roads and tunnels, but also for carbon emission reduction projects and other safety improvements

Combined with funding at the State level, Indiana will invest roughly \$175 million in INDOT projects in 2023. By 2026, that amount is expected to be roughly \$232 million. According to the Department of Transportation, Indiana has nearly 1,200 bridges and 5,478

miles of highway that are in poor condition. Besides the investments in roads, bridges, etc., Indianapolis International Airport is getting about \$13 million in upgrades, which will make travel to and from Indiana much smoother. Other projects in our area, which include the "I-69 Finish Line" and "Clear Path 465" will cut down on commute times and vehicle repair costs.

With all this investment, the work needs to be done timely, safely and proficient. That's where Local #103 Operating Engineers come in. I hear all the time from our signatory contractors how pleased they are with the efficiency of Local #103 Operators. Hearing that makes me prouder than I already am to work for you. As we approach the new year, we have Agreements that are up for negotiation including the Heavy Highway and Distribution Agreements. We will keep you informed on meetings regarding these negotiations, so please keep your eye on your mail for these postcards.

As the workload has increased, the membership of Local #103 has increased dramatically. If you see a new member or new apprentice on the job site, take some time to introduce yourself, pass along your knowledge and welcome them by explaining the benefits of being a new Union Brother or Sister. We have to remember the generations of Operating Engineers

that came before us. They laid the foundation for what we have today, and they deserve our appreciation. With that being said, for the younger Operating Engineers new to Local #103, listen to, and watch the older members on the jobsite, their wealth of knowledge and experience will be beneficial to you as you grow in your career. If we can all do that, the future of Local #103 is bright. Please continue to be safe on the job, and in your travels. In closing, always keep in mind this phrase, UNITED WE STAND, DIVIDED WE FALL.

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

MID CENTRAL OPERATING ENGINEERS HEALTH AND WELFARE FUND

Brief summary of the plan

- Deductible:
- Single \$500.00
- Family \$500.00 per/\$1,500.00 max per year

Prescription Drug Coverage: Prescription drug coverage can play an important role in your overall health. Recognizing the importance of this coverage, the Plan offers coverage for your short-term prescription needs as well as your long-term prescription needs. The Fund has contracted with a prescription drug manager to provide you with access to a network of participating retail pharmacies and a mail order program. You save money for yourself, and the Plan, when you have your prescriptions filled at a participating retail pharmacy.

Clinics: Clinics are now open and covered by your Health & Welfare Fund (by appointment only). Health & Wellness Centers are a place where you and your eligible dependents can go for a wide variety of health services:

- Primary health care services, including sick visits
- Care for chronic illnesses
- No-cost medicines prescribed by the clinic providers and available at the clinic
- Lab tests at no cost when done at the clinic
- Orders for bloodwork needed by other providers, performed at no charge
- Health education

HEALTH REIMBURSMENT ACCOUNT

One dollar (\$1.00) per hour of your hourly Health & Welfare contribution is allocated to your HRA account. Eligible reimbursements include deductibles, co-pays and other non-covered services. To submit a claim, an HRA form may be obtained from Health & Welfare's website, or in any district office and submitted, along with proper documentation for the eligible expense, to Health & Welfare. Apprenticeship & Training Report

We are in our 1st week of scheduled classes at the training center. This week we are hosting Ivy Tech Personal Finance and Human Relations in the Workplace for 1st and 2nd year apprentices. Outside, we have 2nd year apprentices working on equipment proficiency testing. All apprentices need to pass 4 equipment tests to graduate from the program. We have started a total of 63 new apprentices since April of 2022 which gives us a total of 189 apprentices in the program. Class schedules were sent out to all active members in early October. If you did not receive a schedule, you can sign-up online at www.iuoe103training.org or you can call the office at 765-378-0013 to get classes scheduled. Please check all your certifications to see what updates and classes you may need.

On February 7th, 2022, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) put in place new requirements to obtain a Commercial Driver's License. Drivers applying for Class A or Class B CDL for the first time who are issued a CDL permit after 2/7/2022, must complete an Entry Level Driver Training Program (EDLT) with a registered training provider prior to testing. I investigated EDLT training cost, and it is on average \$4000 to \$5000 for the required training. The signatory contractors for Operating Engineers Local 103 are always in need of CDL drivers. It is for these reasons we have developed a registered CDL training program for all Operating Engineers Local 103 members. The course will consist of a 40-hour theory classroom training. This portion of the training will cover all written CDL topics that you will be tested on in the written exam

for your CDL permit including Pre-Trip Inspection and Air Brakes. The program has purchased a semi-tractor and a Talbert lowboy trailer for the driving portion of the training. This training will consist of Over the Road driving and practicing backing procedures that are required for the driving exam. We are scheduling our 1st class for CDL Class A training from 1/23/23-1/27/23. If you are interested in this class, please call the training center to sign-up for this class or put your name on the list for future classes. Please check our website news ticker for updates.

NCCCO is moving away from all paper/pencil testing for written exams. As of January 1st, 2024, NCCCO will no longer offer paper/pencil written exams. All written exams will be computer based. I have scheduled 4 paper/pencil exams in 2023. The dates for these PPT exams will be 2/12/23, 4/23/23, 7/16/23 and 10/15/23. The immediate change for our members will be the registration process to sign up for anything related to NCCCO testing. As of December 1st, 2022, all NCCCO candidates (New or Existing) will have to create a MyCCCO account on CCO's website at www. nccco.org. This account is different from the MyCCO app. Your new MyCCO account portal will be the only way to register and pay for Written and Practical exams in the future. NCCCO has also changed the load charts used in all Mobile crane written exams. On and after January 9th, 2023, the candidate will no longer have a choice on which crane load charts they sign up for. The swing cab or TLL will use Linkbelt load chart. The fixed cab or TSS will use the Manitex load chart. The lattice boom crane will be combined with the lattice truck crane.

The new designation will be LAT for lattice boom. The load charts will be Manitowoc 888 with lattice boom truck crane questions in the general knowledge portion of the exam. If you are scheduled for the written exam on 2/12/23 and you are not studying these new charts, please call the office so we can send you the updated load charts for the exam.

The program is in the middle of upgrading all of the GPS equipment. We are moving from the Trimble GCS 900 machine control systems to the latest Trimble Earthworks systems. We already have the CAT D5 K and the CAT D6 T upgraded to the Earthworks system. SI-Tech has the new Earthworks systems for the CAT 336 excavator and the CAT 12M motor grader. We are just waiting on an install date. You also have the option to train on the latest Top-Con GPS systems installed on a John Deere 650 and a new Komatsu D-39 Intelligent dozer. This equipment is available for training here at the training site all year round. Call to reserve your preferred piece of equipment today.

In October, Local 103 Apprenticeship Program teamed up with the Indianapolis Fire Department Rescue team for Tower crane rescue training. I feel this a winwin for both organizations, considering all the tower crane work we have in the Indianapolis area. This is training I hope they never have to utilize but that's why we train to try and prepare for all scenarios.

are also doing the site work on Central's new facility.

There have been several new plans let on box buildings in the same area. Wilhelm is doing two parking garages at the Criminal Justice Center, and some other miscellaneous buildings. Wilhelm also has numerous sites on the east side digging tunnels and shafts. Super Excavators is in town doing a bore for them at Pleasant Run. Crider, Calumet, and Wilhelm are all working on the Purple Line of 38th St.

The 2023 workload is looking very good. Walsh has two busy seasons ahead of them with I-69 tied in to 465 and the IU Health Hospital job downtown; looks like a six-year job for a lot of members. You'll

need your IUCSAT card, 10 Hr. OSHA, forklift certification and possibly your vaccination shots. The new Pan Am motel is supposed to break ground this coming spring; this will last for a couple of years.

We also have the new Alinco building going up at the old GM Stamping Plant. It's a large site and this too, is expected to last for a couple of years. Superior has some bridges on the northwest side on 465 staring in the spring over 96th St, so look for more wonderful traffic! Milestone will be finishing up FedEx's new runway this year. Alberici will be expanding more buildings at FedEx this year as well.

With the 2022 work season ending and the New Year approaching, there is a lot of work still going on in my area of District 1, with

a few road jobs that are supposed to start when the weather breaks next year. Rieth Riley and Crider & Crider are still working at 276th St. and US 31 doing a bridge and round- a-bouts. HIS is doing a bridge and round-a-bouts at 236th St and US 31, they have another bridge job on State Road 32 in Noblesville. Beaty and Gradex have a road project through Noblesville with a new bridge over White River and 4 round-a-bouts that are supposed to alleviate traffic congestion through downtown Noblesville.

There is going to be a new bridge over Allisonville Road at 176th St. with a round-a-bout underneath. Hello brothers and sisters, we have clicked off another year. I want to thank everyone for their hard work this season. Hope everyone had a safe and enjoyable holiday season. Great news, the east and west roads out of



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the western district are open! We have several jobs that will be trying to work thru the winter months and several more to kick off in the spring. Current work going on in the area include: multiple housing additions, Klondike School, storm water CSO Storage on South River Road. Teal Road, Oak Dale Dam, Cross Roads Ph II, Hardy Hill Solar Farm, and the I 65 road project.

2023 outlook includes the continuation of 2 solar farms, Cross Roads (wind farm) Ph II, Interstate 65, State Road 38 Ph I, Teal Road, a 5-million-dollar bridge/walking trail project, State Road 26 E from State Road 29. Along with that there are multiple INDOT lettings that include several small structure replacements, paving projects, and bridge deck replacements.

Please check out the class schedule for the training site. I recommend the following: OSHA 10, MSHA 48 new miner, NCCCO crane class, forklift certification, GPS training, and our asphalt class. By taking advantage of these classes, this helps the member and the contractor to keep up with the

industry needs.

DISTRICT No. 3 By CORY LODGE Business Representative

The eastern side of District 3 is still pretty busy after a very busy late summer and early fall. All of our local contractors have had a very busy year and all of the talk is pointing towards the 2023 season being very busy as well. With that being said, I would like to focus this letter on the project that

has everyone's attention and focus, the Stellantis Battery Plant project. ES Wagner started the dirt work and site prep portion of the 300-acre project in August with 23 Operating Engineers working every hour possible at its peak. The dirt package is far from complete

with a few more bid packs to come early next year. With CCC and Yates being the GC on the project, however, CCC is going to self - preform a big portion of the work. CCC started footers and foundation work the first week of December and Toledo Caisson is working 2 drill rigs and 2 cranes installing caissons as well.

The work schedule for this project has steel erection starting in February after the completion of the main building pad being done in January. This is by far the biggest project on the eastern side of District 3 in a long time. I want to include some of the interesting facts that show the size and scope of this project; these numbers are for just the main building alone however, there are 13 total buildings on this project:

1,100 caissons requiring 140,000 yards of concrete 150,000 tons of stone for main building pad. 2.4 million square feet of finished floor. At least 100 semi loads of steel, 5-million-man hours (all trades). Mid 2023, at its peak, approximately 1,300 tradesmen employed. December 2023 equipment starts to arrive, end of 2025, the plant is scheduled to be in production. As you can see this is going to be some very good, long-term work for Local 103. I want to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a safe, happy and busy New Year.


