I want to thank everyone for coming to the Local 103 picnic in September. It was the biggest turnout we have had, and I look forward to having even more participation next year.

Hopefully, everyone received the map from health and welfare with the list of new clinic access. We were able to add multiple new locations in all three districts. 
Prescription Drug Coverage: Prescription drug coverage can play an important role in your overall health. Recognizing the importance of this coverage, the Plan offers coverage for your short-term prescription needs as well as your long-term prescription needs. The Fund has contracted with a prescription drug manager to provide you with access to a network of participating retail pharmacies and a mail order program. You save money for yourself, and the Plan, when you have your prescriptions filled at a participating retail pharmacy.

Clinics: Clinics are now open and covered by your Health & Welfare Fund (by appointment only). Health & Wellness Centers are a place where you and your eligible dependents can go for a wide variety of health services:

- Primary health care services, including sick visits
- Care for chronic illnesses
- No-cost medicines prescribed by the clinic providers and available at the clinic
- Lab tests at no cost when done at the clinic
- Orders for bloodwork needed by other providers, performed at no charge
- Health education

HEALTH REIMBURSMENT ACCOUNT

One dollar (\$1.00) per hour of your hourly Health & Welfare contribution is allocated to your HRA account. Eligible reimbursements include deductibles, co-pays and other non-covered services. To submit a claim, an HRA form may be obtained from Health & Welfare's website, or in any district office and submitted, along with proper documentation for the eligible expense, to Health & Welfare. Apprenticeship & Training Report

We started our winter classes on November 28th, 2023, here at the Training Center. We sent paper schedules in the mail at the beginning of October. If you did not receive a schedule, it is posted on our new Local #103 Apprenticeship and Training website and mobile application. www. iuoe103training.org. The information on the website is password protected. To gain access to the website and the mobile application you will first need to sign up for verification that you are a Local 103 member. Once the verification is complete, you will have access to all the class schedules and registration for classes. Please call the Training Site if you have any registration issues at 765-378-0013. We can also register you for any classes or annual refresher classes you may need by telephone.

I have been talking about NCCCO's change over to all computer-based testing for over a year. Well, it's finally here. As of January 1st, 2024, NCCCO will not be offering paper/pencil written exams anymore. Written exams for all crane designations will now only be available via computer. To register for any computer based or practical examinations members will have to register at www.nccco.org under "My CCO" registration tab. The members have three different options when signing up for these exams. The option I like best is OPT testing:

Online Proctor Testing or OPT allows candidates, once scheduled, to take CCO written exams online using their own internet connected computer. From almost anywhere 24 hours a day, 7 days a week 365 days a year. When the candidate has completed their exam, they will receive an immediate score

report. No more waiting two or three weeks to see if you have passed or failed the exam. If you do not have a computer or internet, we have computer stations set up here at the training center for you to take your exam on.

Event Online Testing or EOT is now an option for those who typically take the exams in a group setting. EOT permits multiple candidates to take CCO exams via computer at authorized CCO EOT testing centers. Local 103 Training Center is authorized to deliver EOT testing to our members. We have 12 computer stations set up for EOT testing. The dates for these exams are February 11th, 2024, April 21st, 2024, July 14th, 2024, and October 13th, 2024. If we need to schedule more EOT exam dates, we will. We can have it set-up in a week or two or you can just schedule an OPT exam that you can do at home or here at the Training Center.

Test Center Testing or TCT allows candidates to take CCO written exams at a network of nearly 600 testing centers via computer. These will mostly be IVY Tech Facilities.

We have added a few new pieces of equipment to the fleet this year. We purchased a 2023 Komatsu 210 LCI intelligent excavator. It came with lates Topcon GPS with automatics to help keep you on grade. We now have a total of seven machines with GPS machine control for our members. We have Trimble earthworks on CAT 12 M-2 motor grader, CAT 330 excavator, CAT D6T and CAT D5K dozers. On the Topcon side we have a Komatsu D39I, John Deere 650 dozers and our new Komatsu 210 LCI excavator. This equipment is here year-round for individual training. Just call and reserve the equipment you need. We also

purchased three new 2023 CAT 259 skid steers for training.

In closing, all of us here at the Training Center would like to wish all of the members a Happy Holidays and Prosperous New Year!

They will also be working alongside Beaty on the demolition of the Pan Am garage for the new high-rise building and ball room for the Convention Center.

The Indianapolis Airport is going to be replacing another runway and taxiway this year. FedEx is still expanding their site. I-69 should be switching traffic this month, calling for a long and busy summer with long hours. They're hoping to wrap things up in November 2024. If you don't have your 10 Hr. OSHA, you need to get it, per the Highway Agreement. Most of our contractors are looking for deep pipe operators that can pull boxes. If you are interested, go to the Training Site to get your training. Winter time is the best time to go if you aren't working. We are also looking for people that are interested in



getting certified to operate cranes. Everyone be safe and have a prosperous summer.

As we end the 2023 season and things are winding down, there is still a lot of work going on in my area of District 1. Crider and Crider is still working at 276th and US 31. Pontem is there also working on the mainline bridge deck. HIS is at 236th and US 31 finishing up the bridge and round-a-bouts. Reynolds Construction is also working in the 236th and US 31 area on a water tower and water plant, also, putting in sewer and waterlines. They are also in Sheridan putting in a water tower and water plant.

Midwest Mole has been doing the directional boring for the project at 236th and US 31. Milestone has been in Sheridan re-doing curbs, sidewalks and resurfacing some roads. Brothers and Sisters,

Congratulations to you all for another successful season. Many are still going strong while some are enjoying well deserved time off. My appreciation for your dedication to our craft and skill brought to the job every day can't be said enough.

Work in the counties of Henry, Wayne, Rush, Fayette, and Union has been good toward the tail end of the season into winter. Lack of rain days throughout late summer and fall has put contractors ahead of schedule and have wound down earlier than expected. Machines are staffed with few jobs kicking off at the moment.

The dog food industry has made a commitment to the eastern front of district one. Diamond Dog food in Rushville has been a big job. W.B. Koester, Indiana Earthworks, Reynolds, Beaty, Berkel, and Smith Erectors have put in considerable man hours on site. Blue Buffalo in Richmond have also put members to work with Milestone, Miller Bros., Shook, Barnhart, and Capitol City Crane contributing.

East of Blue Buffalo is Liberation Laboratories, with R.B. Jergens and Shook Construction performing work. Liberation is using this building as a test bed for their business model, another building sixteen times the size is in the works if this goes as expected.

Paving work was steady, with Milestone and E&B milling and filling on highways and state roads. Street reconstruction throughout New Castle was completed by members with White Construction. Morphey has done various storm pipe installations across county and state roads.

Bridge and small structure work in the area has been good. Milestone is wrapping up several jobs along US 40 at Dunreith, Lewisville, and Centerville. Beaty is working the US 27 overpass removal and replacement through downtown Richmond. Pontem had bridge rehab work over SR 109.

Upcoming work in the area include the Revive I-70 project, slated to bid next year, with packages in total of nearly a half billion dollars. Reid Hospital in Connersville, with Shook and Skanska, slated to start in the early spring. Various water and waste water treatment plants across several municipalities have been scheduled to bid, in addition to \$25 million for combined sewer separation in Richmond.

Members, invest in yourselves by learning new skills and certificates at the training site. Cheers and see you in the spring.

We are coming into the slow down period in the INDOT sector up in this area with road recon construction. It seems like there is always a 10-year cycle with the roads in this area and right now we are going through the time that the paving slows and the bridges pick up. Looks like the city and county packages in Allen County will be good this year. Subdivisions look to stay strong in the area also. Wilhelm is beginning to get the parking garage up out of the ground downtown. Also, there has been a lot of talks of Nipsco doing upgrades to gas lines around the area all next year.


While we begin to get everything ready for the upcoming season we need to get back to the basics. While this is nothing new it seems, we become complacent with the abundance of work in the areas. This is when we need to double down and get to the training site and get our certs renewed, finally quit putting off those certs that we keep saying we want and just keep finding excuses to push it. Well now is this time

while we have all this work available, when we need to build our personal resumes with CCO and CDL. Many upcoming projects in the area are going to be requiring these special qualifications.

With Project Zodiac (Google), and solar projects popping up all over the surrounding counties, certifications are going to be in high demand. We have strived to push this Industry into a safe work environment and the companies agree. This is why the big jobs are requiring OSHA 10 (which is a class that is put on throughout the districts and at the training site). Many CCO crane operators will be needed in the upcoming season. I encourage you to sign up for the classes. We have some of the best instructors down at the site that will spend all the time needed to get you prepared and comfortable in running the equipment. If you have questions or would like some advice on a path that you're interested in and not sure how to start, I encourage you to reach out to your Business Agents. This is what we are here for.

Work is steady but rapidly slowing down in the southern leg of District 2. The



Riverstart 3 solar farm in Randolph Co. is nearly complete for the time being. Although, there is the installation of 300,000 panels left to complete. White Construction has also picked up phase 4 of Riverstart with a start date of early spring for the laydown yard and clearing. Kokosing Industrial landed the bid for the Collector Station in Parker City for phase 4 of Riverstart. They will be pulling 10,000 cubic yards of overburden from the Muncie IMI

to place for the pad and road at the Collector System. The previous 3 Collector Stations have went non-union, so I welcome Kokosing to town with open arms. Local 103 has a Memorandum of Understanding signed with EDF Renewables for the proposed Lake Trout Solar Farm in Blackford Co. We are hopeful that Blackford County Council is in favor of this project and it can start in late 2024. These solar farms benefit both the environment and the economy by maximizing clean energy production and creating massive amounts of working hours for our members. So, if a solar farm comes to your community, lets stand collectively and support it.

Michels Utility has finished the majority of their distribution work in and around Muncie. At one point this year, Michels had over 12 crews in the Muncie area. Miller Pipeline is currently working on US 27 for Nipsco and picked up a large portion of distribution work around Indiana from Centerpoint late last week. Otis Minnesota finally called it quits earlier in the month after completing a large portion of the 19 miles of removal and re-in-stall of 12-inch gas main that started in Delaware Co. and finished in Henry Co. Otis will try to resume the pipeline early in 2024 after they obtain the easement rights for some properties that are tied up in the court system.

Milestone continues bridge work in Adams Co. on State Road 218 with 2 complete reconstruct bridge decks. Milestone also picked up a \$5 million bridge reconstruct on State Road 3 over Salamonie River in Wells Co. Most, if not all, of the asphalt plants in District 2 have shut the heat off with winter maintenance to start in late January of 2024. Fleming Excavating has picked up both phases for the Adam's Co. sewer extensions that should start in early January with a completion date in early June.

Atlas Crane is currently doing a re-power at the Headwaters Wind Farm. Atlas has completed maintenance on 2 out of the 10 wind turbines. That work should continue thru the next few months, weather permitting. Poindexter Excavating been jumping between the IMI quarries in and around Bluffton and Muncie areas. Overhead Conveyor Co. has kept our CCO and Forklift operators busy over the holiday shutdowns at the GM Truck and Bus Plant. We have an average of 30 members reporting to work over the Christmas shutdown. It just goes to show how important those certs are and how we can keep members working thru the off season. So, if you find yourself with free time this winter, give the training site a call and see what certifications are available for you to obtain.

I want to wish everyone a safe and Happy Holiday and remind everyone that being part of a union is more than just a paycheck. It's about being part of a collective organization that protects the rights and interests of each member and gives each of us a voice in the workplace. Union For Life.

KOKOMO DISTRICT No. 3 By CORY LODGE

Well, to say the eastern side of District 3 has been busy is an UNDER statement! With a lot of work still going on, many of our members won't have much of an off season. Sega & Thieneman are still trying to work on the Logansport utility job that will include a river crossing next year. Kokosing is still working at the Kokomo Waste Water Treatment Plant and that job is over a year now. Bunn Excavating is working on the infrastructure for the Industrial Park in Gas City, as the weather allows.

5-Star Energy is still working in Logansport as well, and will be there for quite a while. The Jawahn project in Kokomo, that will support the new battery plant is still keeping R.H. Mariln busy setting steel. As usual, there is work going on in the existing Stellantis plants in Kokomo, with Shook, Walbridge, and CCC doing projects in the Casting Plant as well as ITP and KTP. Marion GM is still very busy with the new press room project with CCC, Shook, IICC and S & S staying very busy there.

The new Stellantis Battery in Kokomo has been the biggest job in the area for sure, and we are fast approaching 200 members that are working on this project. The biggest players out there currently are, E.S. Wagner, CCC, BMWC, PMI, Poynter, IMS, S & S, C.J., Hughes (Contractors Rental). Maxim also has several cranes on site. The equipment installation portion of the project will begin in January and we are being told that around 8,000 shipping containers are on their way, which will add to employment opportunities for us as well.

In October it was announced that Stellantis would be building a 2nd battery plant in Kokomo, next to the one that is currently being built. The start date for the 2nd battery plant is not firm as of yet. However, it does sound as though it will be in 2024. There are also talks underway about a 1100-acre solar farm, in Cass County, that


